## TREASURERS'S REPORT

### **Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks Inc. Treasurers Report For the year ended 30<sup>th</sup> June 2016**

The Financial Statements consisting of the Administration Account, Service Account and Balance Sheet are attached. **(Attachment B)**

The **Administration Account** shows a Net Income of \$4,262. Which is mainly from Fines (\$1447) and the Weekly Raffle (\$1,435). There are no unusual items in the Administration Account.

The **Service Account** shows a net income of \$269. This is after paying for only one Overseas Scholarship to the AGN School at a cost of \$6,369 (as a result of a having a credit for one student) and not two as originally budgeted for.

Also an unexpected income of \$7,007 was received from the BBQ's conducted on behalf of the REPAT Foundation.

The above two items had the effect of changing a Service Account budget expectation of a \$13,000 loss in the Service Account to a small \$269 profit.

The overall result has left the Club with enough funds to enable it to support 2 student Scholarships for the AGN School in the 2016/2017 year.

It has since been agreed that the scholarships for the 2016-17 year be based on students commuting rather than living on campus. This cost saving has allowed RCAP to continue with two scholarships at a lower cost per student.

## ADMINISTRATION REPORT

**The Administration Director manages a range of roles and projects. These include:**

1. **The Venue** – We continue to meet at the Naval and Military Club and ensure good relationships with personnel

**MEMBERSHIP REPORT**  
**prepared by Director Bob Congdon**

**Present Situation**

The contribution and commitment of our members remains high. All members have contributed to our fundraising with activities such as BBQs, and Raffles. At the same time, we have contributed to community and international disaster aid activities, education assistance, etc.

The club has enjoyed the contribution and enthusiastic participation of several young expatriate members and their partners over the past two to three years. Their enthusiasm and energy has infected us all. We have also benefitted from other newer members who have taken the initiative to organize successful fundraising (Raffle) and service activities (Sewing lessons for women in the South Pacific). The initiative of other members and partners has resulted in opening new avenues for fund raising.



## **Recruiting**

Members continue to provide names of potential Rotarians. Several attended meetings as guests of the club however we were successful in attracting only one new member who very shortly after induction resigned. Follow up failed to reveal the underlying reason.

In November members were provided with a Rotary Coffee Table book "Humanity in Motion Down Under" and a covering letter "An Open Letter to Community Minded Professionals" for distribution to likely "recruits". This invited potential members to consider the Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks as an opportunity to contribute to community while developing leadership and professional skills. This package was also distributed to the Wakefield Street Hospital, The Naval, Military and Air Force Club, and other potential sources of interested individuals.

Notwithstanding these initiatives, the club's capacity to operate effectively has declined with a loss of members. These losses have arisen because of illness, relocation, and transfer to other Rotary Clubs. RCAP commenced the year with 26 members and after resignations and new members concluded with 25 members and 1 honorary member.

## **Impediments to membership growth**

In common with many clubs our capacity to attract new members has declined. Many reasons are given by those approached including: -

1. Time is more precious than talent or treasure.
2. If in a relationship, both are often working and sharing household and child rearing duties.
3. Daily work commitments extend well beyond the accepted work-day.
4. Cost – attendance at meetings and the tendency for Rotary Clubs to raise funds from members rather than publicly.
5. Reduced corporate interest in contributing indirectly (via Rotary) to social/welfare projects.
6. Increased competitive pressure on small business and its proprietors.
7. Proliferation of "service clubs" and their branches throughout the community.

The following information was presented to members during the year. Both the President of RI and a former zone membership coordinator make some very relevant points that could form a sound basis for the development of a successful recruiting campaign.

## **The membership Challenge K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran President Rotary International 2015-2016**

"We have to find a way to bring back the fundamentals that built our organization: the emphasis on high ethical standards in all aspects of our lives, and the classification system that encourages a diversity of expertise in each club," he said. "Too often these ideas are viewed as little more than inconvenient obstacles to increasing our membership. But they have been essential to Rotary's success, and we ignore them at our own peril."

"We need to reposition our image, which we recognize has faded in many parts of the world," he said. "There are no easy answers to any of these questions. And yet the answers must somehow be found. We are the ones who must find them," said Ravindran.

**Reversing a Membership Free fall Jim Henry Zone 34 Regional Rotary International Membership Coordinator 2008 – 11 (Florida, Georgia and the Caribbean)**

No club or district deliberately loses members. External forces cause a low percentage of membership loss.

Internal issues that are difficult to recognize and resolve, cause clubs' major losses, primarily because they tend to render the clubs ineffective at satisfying member's needs. Eager to succeed within Rotary's one-year leadership cycle, club leaders often try quick fixes (like membership drives) which generally waste time, effort, and resources that should be used to identify and improve the clubs' ability to satisfy present and future members' reasons for joining.

**Create a powerful guiding coalition**

The number one internal problem of membership-distressed clubs is the lack of consensus among the leaders, followed closely by frustration and apathy, resulting in the loss of desire and initiative to make necessary changes. The past, present, and future leaders themselves have not reached a consensus on the direction the club should be heading.

**Create a systematic strategic plan**

To create a systematic strategic plan for long-term survival, any organization must center the plan on satisfying its customers by establishing a distinctive position (*core strength*) that gratifies the customers' needs! Then the organization must adhere to this position so diligently that other organizations will find it too difficult or too costly to duplicate.

Rotary clubs' present customers are its members. To maintain long-term growth and viability, clubs, like other organizations, must attract new customers (members.) So, what is the profile of Rotary clubs' potential members, and what needs do they have that club membership can satisfy?

**Distinctive Position (*Core strength*)**

Many Rotary clubs have tried to sustain and increase membership by stressing service as their core strength. This creates a major membership development obstacle because it ignores the new members' needs, which leads to the inability to attract and keep them. Objectively examine the issue from the outsider's point of view – they can gratify their service needs by participating in one or more of the thousands of organizations that offer similar opportunities – with little or no time, talent, or treasure commitment.

**Service to others is a critical Rotary attribute, but it is not a distinctive position.**

For an organization to maintain long-term growth and viability, it must establish a distinctive position that satisfies its customers' needs. For Rotary clubs, that distinctive position is the Objects of Rotary.

Which are: -

To encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and to encourage and foster: -

1. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity of service;
2. High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;
3. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
4. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

## CLUB SERVICE PROJECTS REPORT

**Objectives** - At the Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks we aim to deliver relevant, valued vocational/educational services to our community and continue to support youth programs. RCAP aimed to have a range of vocational talks by members (Cameos), engage in local community service projects, support local and international projects, organise Health Education presentations and continue our work with Rotary New Generations projects and programs.

**There are 4 parts to this Report – Community Service, the AGN School, New Generations and Disaster Aid Australia**

### **A. Community Service - Kathy Cotter**

#### **Goals**

Through fundraising we aim to support a range of community groups such as The Smith Family, St Lukes, the Hutt St Centre, Meals on Wheels, Soles4Souls, and disadvantaged families.



#### **Achievements and Performance**

- a) **Fundraising BBQs** – We were very fortunate this year to have contact with the REPAT Foundation and collaborated with them to raise money at four Bunnings Mile End Warehouse BBQs and the ABC Gardeners Market. Annually we provide a BBQ at the Christmas Pageant BBQ as well. These saw fabulous fellowship and volunteering by our members and friends. **In total we raised \$8735 from these endeavours – a fantastic fundraising year.**
- b) **Meals on Wheels** – each week we maintain our commitment to Meals on Wheels, Hindmarsh by driving the deliverers around the Thebarton Torrensville area. Thanks to Barbara Wheatcroft for managing the roster until the end of the year.
- c) **Wine Sales** – Thanks to Scott Mason our wine sales were a very popular fundraiser again this year **raising \$3030**
- d) **The Weekly Raffle** – members donate a raffle prize each week and this year **we raised \$1425**
- e) **Christmas Hampers**- 4 cartons were purchased and delivered to **SPARK** for disadvantaged families at Christmas – thanks John Hicks for organising this.

- f) **Entertainment Books** – an annual commitment of the sale of 31 books **raised \$429** through online and cash sales – thanks to Jim Davies for the organisation.
- g) **The Smith Family** – The Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks considers that The Smith Family is one of their preferred charities and this year donated \$1980 for educational scholarships for disadvantaged students.
- h) **Hutt Street Centre** – Members participated in their fundraiser, ‘Walk a Mile in their Boots’ and donated ?????
- i) **Polio Eradication** – Each week members add small change to the ‘pink pig’ and this year we raised \$164.
- j) **Soles4Souls** – we continued to donate ‘gently used’ shoes to this charity.

Thank you to all members, family and friends who participated in any of these activities, they provide an opportunity to engage in great fellowship. While some of these activities are fundraisers others are costs and some are neutral but each and all provide opportunities to engage with our community, family and friends, showcase Rotary and ‘do good in the world’.

## **B. AGN SCHOOL Scholarship Report – Bob Congdon**

### **1. Foundation District Discussions**

August 2<sup>nd</sup>. Met with DG John Pohl and PDG Doug Layng ( District Chair of TRF) . Advised that support for the project could not be granted unless the project focus moved to establishing a fund supported by a local association/alumni of past students.

I explained that it would be some years before such students were able to contribute but did explain that currently scholarship funds were contributed through the Gift Foundation ( a registered trust) in India and , specifically, to an account exclusively for the financial operations of the Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks AGN School ScholarshipsBoth John and Doug appeared surprised when I told them that I

felt that further time spent making another application for a district grant would not be a productive use of my time.

## 2. RAWCS

**November 2015.** Checked with past Central Region RAWCS committee members who encouraged me to make application for the AGN Scholarship Project to be accepted as a RAWCS Sponsored project earning DGF status.

**December 11<sup>th</sup>.** 2015. Commenced enquiries for RAWCS project endorsement. Advised to go ahead with an application.

**December-April** explored further alternatives and began collecting required support and advice.

**April 12<sup>th</sup>** Completed an application and circulated it as required- 7 endorsements needed.

**May- September** numerous emails sent as follow up and clarifications. (In excess of 30 email messages.) Advised by the Central Region RAWCS Chair (Jerry Casburn) that his committee would obtain the necessary endorsements. While I expected that endorsements would be obtained based on an independent view I was surprised to learn that in many cases endorsees checked with others before committing.

**September 4<sup>th</sup>.** Advice from Mick Willis (RAWCS HQ), that our project did not qualify because it did not fit within the scope of projects supported by Ausaid and the UN.

**September 4<sup>th</sup>.** Concluded that assistance beyond direct donations from the Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks would not be available to us.

## 3. AGN School discussions

While the above discussions were going on I maintained contact with the school through its Founder, Dr. A. Goundan and the Director of Administration, A. Subramaniam. A review of income and expenditure of our Scholarship account was conducted. It was established that our AGN Scholarship account currently holds approximately USD\$6,000 of uncommitted funds. That is funds that will not be required for the support of scholarships still in progress. This did not include scholarships (2) commencing in 2016.

Recognizing our funding challenges the School Founder and Admin Director proposed that scholarships in future be modified to remove on campus accommodation in years 9-11 and replace this with bus transportation. During Year 12 on campus accommodation will be provided as before. All other scholarship provisions will be provided as in the original plan. It was proposed that this change would take effect from 2016. The cost to the rotary Club of Adelaide Parks will be **USD\$6,740**. Payment will be due in December 2016.

This proposal was discussed by the Board, proposed to the membership and accepted. The AGN School were advised. The selected students were advised that they had been awarded the Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks Scholarships for 2016. The variation (travel vs. on campus accommodation) was acceptable to both who had been attending AGN School until then on this basis.

## 4. The Role of "District"

I have spent an inordinate amount of time involved in internal discussion and negotiations on matters essential to the survival of this project. It most important to note that these discussions and negotiations have arisen because of a desire on the part of Rotarians (outside the RCAP) in positions of

“authority” who have chosen to act as “gatekeepers” rather than “facilitators”. My own view is that only the people “who can add value” to a transaction or plan should be involved in it.

## 5. Conclusion

This project is continuing to provide an excellent education to young talented Indians who would not normally have an opportunity to go on to tertiary studies. The fulfilment brought to the individuals and the economic contribution to India in the years ahead will be significant.

It is clear that financial support from Rotary, beyond that provided by our immediate club, cannot be expected in future. An amount of USD\$1000 plus the current credit in our account (USD\$6,000) will fully cover our commitments for our 2016 commencement students.

The Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks must now consider whether or not it will be either feasible or desirable to continue with this project beyond 2016.

## The GIFT Foundation – Highlights: 2015-16

### Konganapuram Tamil Nadu, India

The GIFT Foundation (கொடைமடட்சி அறக்கட்டளை) is a public charitable trust established in 1998 to promote quality education in rural areas of Tamil Nadu. GIFT secured TNF-USA project approval and started AGN SCHOOL at Konganapuram village in Tamil Nadu in June 1998. It then launched the CBSE Secondary School, APPU ARIVAALAYEM, in 2011. There are about 2200 students studying in both schools now. The Trust is also in the process of starting an Arts and Science College under the name, KAASI COLLEGE, targeted for launch in 2017-18.



All AGN 12<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> students successfully passed the public examinations with the top marks of 1164/1200 (Rotary Scholar) and 495/500, respectively. Of the 920 12<sup>th</sup> graduates from 2007 to 2015, 73% have gone into engineering, 24% into arts/science, 2% into medicine, and 2% into other medical fields. APPU's 10<sup>th</sup> students have done extraordinarily well in their maiden year with all 14 students passing out with 'A' grades.



Our students Monica Balamurugan of AGN and Vaishnavai SG of APPU secured the special honour of participating in the 'Thirukkural Mutrothal' at the Indian Parliament House.



Our students, staff and management collected donations and



August, 2005 was filled with inspiring interactions and 'Thirukkural' related competitions where over 800 students participated and won many prizes. Tamil Mandram organized a first-of-its-kind music concert correlating folk music, 'Punn-Isai', movie-songs and Carnatic music at our school. With the support of 'Kalari Trust', 'Paanchaali Sabatham' kalari-koothu was performed at school campus which helped expose the traditional art form to students.

Under the sponsorship of patron Tr. Mani Rajendran, USA, GIFT contributed Rs.1,40,000 and catalyzed a project under Self-Sufficiency Scheme for the construction of long-awaited compound wall for the Manjakkalpatti Elementary school where Mani had studied during his early years.



'Stanford Nanbarhal' program entered into the tenth year this year, where we hosted two student volunteers from Stanford University, USA. The volunteers actively participated in teaching, skill development and cultural exchange activities during their six weeks stay at the school campus.



The GIFT Foundation Scholarships for 2015-16 were awarded during annual functions last December. 138 Merit and Financial-Aid scholarships totaling Rs.18,92,379 were offered to deserving students, out of which 48 have been sponsored by donors from USA (through TNF-USA), India and other countries. Adelaide Parks Rotary (Australia) Scholarships with full-financial aid were awarded to two students for four-years of study from 9<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup>



### **C. New Generations – George Sinclair**

**The National Youth Science Forum** - Shyanne Premnath from St. Aloysius College was our successful candidate for the 2016 NYSF in Canberra. Her enthusiasm for science subjects and her all-round interests made her an ideal candidate for the Forum.

On her return from the NYSF in Canberra, Shyanne was invited to be Guest Speaker at our club. Shyanne gave a well-planned and interesting summary of her activities at the Forum together with an excellent audio-visual presentation. She explained how she had joined the Medical Stream at the Forum and that this in particular convinced her to make a career in medicine. We provided a reference for Shyanne to support her application for entry into the Medicine course at the University of Adelaide.

The Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks was again pleased to support a young person from our community in this great Science Program .

### **D. Disaster Aid Australia – Dave Tuzewski**

As always, disasters are never far away and Disaster Aid Australia is poised to assist in as many post disaster relief operations as possible.

This past year has seen DAA involved in continuing work in Vanuatu and Fiji as well as in Nepal which also suffered from an Indian border embargo just after their Monsoon last year which delayed our aid.

The family of Disaster Aid International partners has also grown and New Zealand, Columbia, Thailand, Brazil all joining to help the organisation expand and assist more people with urgent need.

Thanks to the DAI Sky hydrant, we can offer 10,000 litres per day of safe drinking water without electricity, chemicals or replacement filters. A resource that is sorely needed and greatly appreciated wherever we provide them. This most valuable equipment can be installed in a community of up to 350 families for AU\$5000 complete with Tanks and piping. Currently there are schemes, including Global Grants under way to assist communities worldwide in obtaining safe drinking water for remote locations. Building on our dream to provide safe drinking water for every child...-Everywhere.

In June 2016 I attended the Rotary International Conference in Seoul, South Korea. The Disaster Aid International Stand in the House of Friendship that Lesley Sparks and I helped to staff was well received and lots of interest was generated.

Earlier in the Year Lesley and I attended the DAA conference in Melbourne. We were treated to great guest speakers and lots of information about the direction of Disaster Aid. There will be another conference in April 2017 and any members are invited to attend. Please see Lesley or me for details.

Recent events led DAI to assist post Cyclone Mathew in Haiti and The Bahamas. Our water filtration system was especially appreciated as Haiti has been suffering from outbreaks of cholera. Our Sky Hydrant filtration system removes cholera as well as most other diseases and provides a feeling of security for the recipients as they endeavour to rebuild their lives.

Of course we are still in the temporary accommodation business and our Family Survival Kits [AU\$800] and tents complement our other relief products. Just a reminder that DAA gifts are tax deductible and that Disaster Aid Australia, and elsewhere, is a ROTARY PROJECT, comprising almost all Rotary volunteers.

We are grateful for the ongoing support from the Rotary club of Adelaide Parks and its members.

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) of Rotary International was established by Arch Klumph, "To do good in the world", the mission of TRF, is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education and the alleviation of poverty. Our Foundation is our own charity to nourish and support. This is why we support it. This year we have done this in a variety of ways including increasing our membership of the Centurion Club. We have also attended a film night and contributed via the Pink Pig donations on a weekly basis.

The District 9500 (our District) Centurion Club (EREY) is a convenient and personal way to support the Humanitarian Work of TRF to alleviate poverty, educate the illiterate and reverse disease by donating \$100 or more every year, for as long as we are able. These contributions are paid into The Australian Rotary Foundation Trust (not to the USA) and are tax deductible.

Polio Plus Pink Pig, as in previous years, has contributed to the eradication of Polio by members putting cash into the Pig every week.

Paul Harris Fellow is a recognition not an award. Anyone who contributes - or in whose name is contributed - a gift of US\$1000 or more to the Annual Programs Fund or Polio Eradication may become a Paul Harris Fellow. Each new PHF receives a commemorative certificate and a Paul Harris Fellow pin. Donors are eligible for PHF recognition when their cumulative giving reaches US\$1000. This year the Board is considering presenting a recognition to either a member of the club or a worthy person in the local community. We now have a high percentage of members in the Centurion Club and I would like to thank them for their continued generosity.
